


### INTRODUCING SADASA'S 2024 - 2026 ISIZULU SYLLABUS




## RUNNER UP PRIMARY SCHOOL CATEGORY




#### WINNER ADULT CATEGORY






# INTRODUCING SADASA'S NEW ADJUDICATING PANEL MEMBERS
