We are proud to celebrate our 80th birthday, and we continue to carry the torch our founder, Professor Elizabeth Sneddon lit 80 years ago. We work to foster lifelong lifeskills, improving verbal communication, and helping young people speak with ease and confidence.

We also provide a showcase platform for children with talent and ability to shine in a non-competitive environment. One such learner was Jean Norman in 1969. Jean has treasured her certificate signed by Elizabeth Sneddon and kept it safe for many years. Imagine her delight when Jean, now Jean Van Elden, recently stumbled across the first certificate she received when she entered the Speech and Drama Festival in Standard 1 (Grade 3). Jean is well known and respected in Arts and Theatre circles in KwaZulu-Natal as an accomplished Actress, Writer and Director while continuing to teach Drama full-time at Eden College in Durban.

Our certificates have been treasured by Festival participants since 1943. This year, young Grace Davidson from Winston Park Primary arrived home filled with excitement with a Certificate of Distinction. Some take the reader through a harrowing journey through mud-filled, filthy waters of abuse, depression and despair to a place of immeasurable beauty, where hope, healing and resilence ultimately prevail. Writing poetry has provided me with a voice to finally speak up for myself, and to be that voice for everyone who hasn't yet found theirs."




SADASA BURSARIES 2023

1983 - 2023: 40 YEARS OF DRAMA

In September of this year, the Ida Gartrell Studio of Speech & Drama in Eshowe marked its 40th year of existence. Celebrations are being planned, and many past and present students have been invited to celebrate this achievement.

Developing your potential since 1983 is the watchword of the studio and it is the motivation for its continued existence.

Over the years, the studio took a turn at more diverse occupations - creative development training workshops, events, and a costume hire wardrobe. The voice, body and breathwork with traumatised patients developed out of a partnership with a clinical phychologist, into The Confidence Clinic. Professional storytelling (specifically Zulu mythology) arose from years of research and the Stargazing and Stories programme. Scriptwriting for children's TV programmes, Child Abuse prevention programmes, Voices beyond the Walls, Radio Plays for Community Radio developed out of many years working in Zululand prisons. Community and NGO projects included working with JIKA, a community college, a Birding Project with rural schools, Senzokuhle, Justice and Women and The New Readers Project. Writing stories for school readers, acting, directing, lecturing, examining, adjudication and teaching Drama in schools has continued on and off.


SYLLABUS 2024-2026
